SONIA GINSBERG UP ON CHARGES

Communist School Teacher Investigated: Six Others Grilled

"Sonia" Ginsberg, teacher in P. S. 170, Brooklyn, had charges preferred against her by the Corporation Council of New York at the request of the Superintendent of Schools, for being a member of the Communist Party: and five other teachers have been investigated by District Attorney Berger, with the result that charges may be preferred against them also.

When asked whether Miss Ginsberg had taught Communism to the pupils under her charge, Superintendent Ettinger replied:

"It does not matter whether she did or not. No teacher can be a member of such an organization and remain a teacher in the New York publie schools. A teacher cannot teach patriotism in the class room if she clongs to an organization that is that our school system stands for

"There is no such a thing as 0-to-3o'clock patriotism. The doctrines. that our teachers are required to esponse in the class room must remain their doctrines after school closes. We are making every effort to wise out radicalism in the New many or few teachers of that stamp they will have to go. Our school system is no place for them."

Mr. Berger claims that three of the other five teachers have already been examined and have admitted membershin in the Communist Party and aggreement with its principles.

The Board of Education is deter mined to make the schools safe for capitalism. Ten more teachers are under suspicion.

Archibald Stevenson, of Lusk Committee farne, has issued a statement to the effect that the presence of L. A. Martens, Soviet Representative in this country, "constitutes a continuing source of danger to our institujons" and intimated that he would like to have Martens deported.

"The excerpts from the Communist Manifesto of Russia," declared Stevenson, "which is signed by both Lenin and Trotsky and others, urges the proletariat of the world to disarm the bourgeoisic at the proper time and to arm the laborers"

Having a pen knife in his pocket, carrying dangerous papers in the shape of an article by Dr. Frank Crane, subscription lists of the Rebei Worker, and some personal letters, being a member of the 1. W. In the realm of safeguarding publie health the Soviet medicine had to set before itself, first of all, those fundamental tasks which the former so-called social (i. e. the former municipal and zemstvo) medicine was not fulfilling. These talks are: medical, help, free and accessible to all, together with the raising of its standard, the removing of unsanitary and directly barmful conditions of life and work of the toilers.

Much has been done of value by the old (zemstvo and municipal) medicine toward the democratization of the medical and sanitary work. But much of it it could not do even if it had the desire to. To get out the city poor from the musty undergrounds into roomy quarters of well built houses; actively to fight against social ills; to create normal working conditions for the worker; all this is unattainable, if one were to stop before private property as being holy and inviolable. The old sanitation did stop before this as before a boundary line which must not be crossed. The Soviet power, being a communistic power, destroyed these barriers. So there opened before the Soviet sanitation a possibility of carrying through a real and not a verbal sanitary policy, and particularly a housing policy, for the benefit of the

SOVET MEDICINE la financial possibility of carrying out the greatest medical-sanitary reforms for the benefit of the poor. The means and supplies of various institutions proved to be enormous. They were many in the time of peace. They grew in the time of war. It was criminal the way they were not made use of (if they were not merely plundered), for as well in the time of Romanoff as also under Kerensky the uniformed official or the prope. "department" was hiding them away from general use.

When the Soviet medicine in Moscow was authorized to include into its province all "departmental" institutions (of Empress Mary, etc.), an astonishing picture appeared. These hospitals represent enormous richness, they are splendidly equipped, but they are either not at all utilized, or they are utilized altogether differently from what is necessary in the interests of city population. As a result, the reorganization alone of these hospitals along one municipal plan offered the possibility to improve the medical work in Moscow, to open wards of which the people could merely dream, and all this not only without additional expenditures, but even reducing former unproductive expenses.

Epidemics Checked.

The same takes place in the field of sanitation. The history of each epidemic cried out against the inco-ordinate actions of the former departments. When a man joins the Communist Party after the "raids" we have just witnessed, does he not laugh at calculating self-interest? Our movement, based on a materialistic philosophy, is an idealistic movement. Class consciousness and the emancipation of the working class are tremendous and inspiring ideals. Else every Communist would be a stoolpigeon. For there's more money in it.

So Marx, in place of ignoring or denying the force of ideology in human history, recognizes it, insists that it is an ever-present phenomenon, and explains it. It is no "exception" to the Marxian law of historical materialism. Let us see how he explains it.

In the Marxian system the economis structure is the basis, the real foundations of the social structure. Out of these economic relations grow codification, sanctification and idealization in law, morality, religion, philosophy, patriotism, poetry, art and other forms of social consciousness. These things Marx calls the superstructure. because they grow out of and are built upon the economic foundation.

The Bourgeois Revolution.

Thus, to select a single example, feudalism disappeared and capitalism took its place only after trade, invention and discovery had developed a merchant-trader-manufacturer class on whose further development feudal institutions had become a fetter. The manufacturer needed free labor and the seri was tied to the soil. Hence developed the ideology of freeing the

aristogracy, alone had political power. rested by Bolshevist tendencies." But the growing capitalist class needed political power to sweep away feudal privileges, monopolies, restrictions on "freedom of trade" and similar hindrances.
