After speaking last Thursday evehing in Everett again, I took the boat to Snohomish the following morning and was met there by Comrades Louis Gottman and W. E. Iverson, who conducted me on a march of about 5 miles over one of the worst roads in civilization, ankle deep in mud and water, to a lumber camp and then shortly after eating supper with the boys in the camp, we wended our way for about another mile through the woods to a schoolhouse, known as "Roberts' precinct."

That night I shared a bunk with one of the workers, and the following morning tramped back over the same road to Snohomish. The Comrades at this place were expecting me and owing to the train being late, and the state of the road, it was almost 3 before I arrived. We at once held a meeting, which was well attended, and immediately afterwards I drove 7 miles more to stay over night with Comrade Stehr, over a rough mountain road. The working people suffer through the change, since a part of them have to toil harder and others are deprived of the chance to earn their living. The economy is profitable to the capitalists, and to them only. Under Socialism every economy in methods of production would benefit the whole people, but until Socialism comes every economy means more fleecing of the workers. The workers have it in their power to change all this.—[Worker.
