#### Where Profit Comes From :-----

The lumber industry is the fourth in the United States, being exceeded by (1) Iron and Steel, (2) Textiles, (3)

The twelfth census report on the lumber industry is now accessible. Here are some pretty interesting figures for the Socialist to argue from.

#### High#Wages.

For instance, the average yearly wage for workers in the lumber industry of the U. S. is \$370; that is, seven dollars a week, or one dollar a day the ear round. How is that for in the year of our Lord and Me-Kinley 1900?

How many children could a lumber-man raise on seven dollars a week?

#### Dividends

Total capital invested in lumber 612

Total cost of raw materials, 318 mil-

Total wages paid, 105 millions

Hence, total cost of product, 423 millions

Total value of product, 567 millions.

Difference between total value and total cost, 144 millions, equal to 22 per cent. dividends on capital invested.

#### Unpaid Labor.

This profit of 144 millions is 25 per cent of 567 millions, the total salue of the product.

There are 283,260 wage earners, pro-There are 283,360 wage earners, producing therefore \$2003 per worker; 25 per cent of this, equal to \$500, is profit, that is, each worker produces \$500 a year profit for the capitalist. That means that each worker in the Lumber Industry of the U. S. does \$500 worth of Unpaid Labor for the Lumb Capitalist.

Put it this way. The workman gets

\$370 paid him as wages out of his product and the capitalist gets \$500 per year out of the worker's product for nothing.

This is what Karl Mark calls "Surplus value," the secret breeding place pins valid, the secret breeding place of capitalist accumulations, the unnoticed hole where the wealth taker filches from the wealth maker.

This is where and how capital, the pickpocket of the modern world, plick his nefarious business of robbing the properties of the modern world.

his nefarious business of lobbing Labor, the unsuspecting Simpleton of the Modern World.
