There is no reason why a Socialist publishing plant, in a city of 200,000 opopulation and with its adjacent territory, should not be a success. At the present time The Socialist is paying money to a capitalist firm every week which might just as well be paid to a Socialist company. With a slight additional rent to what we are paying now the plant can be housed and under proper management a general printing business can be built up.

We have now before us the offer of a good perfecting press, with complete stereotyping outfit, for one thousand dollars. It appears to be a largain and the very thing we need. Then for \$200 more we can put in type and materials to further equip the plant. With \$800 more the maintenance of the plant can be assured for several months to some.
