NEW RATES OF POSTAOR .- Mr. Hopkins from the Committee on the Post Office and Post Roads reported to the House on Monday a bill establishing the following rates of post-

age: For every letter or packet of one-quarter of For every letter or packet of one-quarter of an onne or less, conveyed 300 miles or less, 5 cents over 300 or less thm 600 miles or 10 ents; over 600 miles i 10 cents; and for avery additional quarter of an onnee, or fraction less than a quarter of an onnee, or fraction less than a quarter of an onnee, an additional post-age, except when a fatter is written on a sin-gle sheet of paper weighing yer one quarter of an onnee, or less than one half an onnee, the single postage to be changed, the rakes of 15 cents to be discontinued from and after the 1st of July, 1848, if in the opinion of the Post-mater General the revenues of, the Depart-ment equal its expenditures, and in that case 10 cents shall be obarged for all distances over 300 miles. 300 miles.
