If this is not so the bakers will objee by sending a more correct estimate. If the baker retains one third, or sixty five pounds of the bread made from each barrel of dour, there will re-main 196 pounds of bread for customers. When flour is six dollars per barrel, it comes at about three cents per pound; and the bread may be atforded, at the bake house, at three cents per pound, provided we have allowed enough to the baker for his labor, fre-and yeast.
