



ZURICH, Switzerland—(By Cable) — Twenty-eight more Junker bombing planes are on the way from Nazi Germany to the Spanish Fascists on the Steamer Azarama of the Woermann Line, which left Hamburg July 31st.

A Hamburg correspondent who saw the cargo loaded, stated the planes were shipped under orders of General Hermann Goering, of the Nazi Reich Air Ministry.

The steamer is to stop at the German war base, Emden, t pick up an additional load of arms and ammunition, consist ing of machine guns, air bombs rifles, etc. From there it will continue to a destination chosen by General Franco in Spanish

SAN FRANCISCO. - A longburied movie newsreel photograph has supplied air-tight proof of Tom Mooney's innocence of the San Francisco Preparedness Day bombing in 1916.

At the same time, word has arrived here of great mass demonstrations of support for Tom Mooney in various parts of the country, in the past week. Thousands of workers came to the huge Hippodrome in New York, where the Mooney-Billings meeting was sponsored by the Central Labor Council.

#### Neutrality Pact

PARIS.—Seven nations—France Germany, Italy, Soviet Union Portugal, Belgium, and Great Britain-were reported to have acceded to France's demand for a neutrality accord.

However, Mussolini was said to have accasted "in principle" and attached three conditions: stopping of enrollment of volunteers, raising of public subscriptions and manifestations and press campaigns in favor of either Fascists or the Spanish government; assurance that the pact will bind both governments and private individuals, and asks whether France proposes some form of control to supervise application of any neutrality agreement.

EARL BROWDER: HIS LIFE

(A Biography)

(Continued From Last Issue)

Throughout his life, Earl Browder spent a great deal of his study on the colonial question. How this interest came into existence is worth telling:

As a youth in Wichita, Kansas, Browder used to walk down the railroad tracks for several miles to his place of

One blustery day in the fall of 1911, a hand-car full of Mexican laborers passed him and a paper fluttered from the tracks. The wind wrapped it around Browder's foot and as he leaned over to toss it off, he noticed type in both Spanish and Eng-



### AS WE SEE IT

#### THE SAILORS' CHARTER SITUATION

SITUATION is developing in the Sailors Union which if left unchecked may seriously affect the unity of the maritime unions in the coming negotiations for the opening of the arbitration awards which expire September 30th.

All the unions are now ballotting on the opening of the awards in order to propose amendments for the improvement of its conditions, which are especially important for the seamen. This procedure makes it possible for the unions to consult with each other, and take joint action to present demands to the shipowners. If the employers are presented with such a united front of the maritime unions, they not be able to play off one craft against the other, for the p. pose of continuing the intolerable conditions of the seamen.

#### MAKING UNITY DIFFICULT

Some of the leaders of the Sailors Union, however, have adopted an attitude toward the other affiliates of the Maritime Federation which make co-operation and unity more difficult. When the I.S.U. officials revoked the charter of the Sailors Union, the shipowners hoped to use this splitting tactic to break the solidarity of the seamen crafts, and the unity of the seamen and longshoremen in the Maritime Federation.

The sailors presented a solid front against this attack, and unanimously signed pledge cards to stand by their union and to fight to remain in the I. S. U. and A. F. of L. The sailors' fight for the return of their charter won for them the support of all the maritime unions and the sympathy and support of large sections of the organized labor movement.

This solid front has forced the I. S. U. officials to back water. They are also facing a growing revolt of the rank and file of the I. S. U. on the East Coast and the Gulf.

#### WHY HUNTER MADE HIS OFFER

All these factors have forced Ivan Hunter, the secretary of the International Seamen's Union, to offer the return of the sailors' charter and make many favorable concessions to the sailors which represents a complete reversal of the previous position taken at the I. S. U. Convention by the reactionary officials.

The one unsatisfactory condition in the proposals is the question of the enforcement of the new distatorial Constitution of the U.S. U., which was railroaded through the I.S. U. convention only after the Sailors Union of the Pacific was illegally

Nevertheless, these proposals represent a basis for further negotiations, because with the one exception of the Constitution all the other conditions offered are similar to the conditions demanded by the Sailors Union itself.

All the other maritime unions are in favor of the Sailors Union taking some steps to regain its charter; the other I; crafts, like the Marine Firemen and the Marine Cooks and ards, are operating under considerable autonomy and act. there is no attempt to enforce the new Constitution on the

The I. L. A. has urged the Sailors to go back into the I. S. U and voted that if the I. S. U. officials attempt to enforce the new Constitution to the detriment of the Sailors Union, the L. A. will give its full support to the sailors.

### THE RETURN TO THE A. F. OF L.

Some of the officials of the Sailors Union have adopted an uncompromisingly hostile attitude toward returning to the I. S. U. and A. F. of L., ignoring the fact that the membership signed pledged-cards to fight for the return of their charter. They have also developed a hostile attitude toward any efforts on the part of the other unions in the Maritime Federation to facilitate the return of the charter.

This is a reflection of the fact that some of the syndicalist elements in the union do not want to return to the A. F. c and are therefore placing every possible obstacle in the way of successful negotiations with the I. S. U.

We do not believe that this opinion is shared by the majority of the membership, who surely realize the need for being a part of the main stream of the American labor movement.

The A. F. of L. does not consist of the Greens and Wolls, but of the millions of organized militant workers who are ready to fight and strike for their rights. The I. S. U. does not consist of the Scharrenbergs and Olanders, but of the thousands of militant seamen who are rapidly awakening to the need for taking over their own union, and the time is not far off when they will, as did the maritime workers of the Pacific Coast.

The sailors must not divorce themselves from the other unions of the Maritime Federation, at this crucial time when demands are to be presented to the employers. We believe that all sincere militants in the Sailors Union see that such a course would

#### A SOLID FRONT IS ESSENTIAL

It is their duty to do everything possible to fight for t turn of their charter in the I. S. U., which would be the greatest blow to the shipowners who are looking hopefully toward Sep. 30th for a break in the ranks. The maritime unions must present a solid front; this is the only course by which the seamen can gain their demands.

By An Alaska Canner From the time the new Alaska Cannery Workers Union was formed to the time the agreement was signed by the packers bout three months elapsed. In the first two months an extenrive drive was carried on to draw in all the men who had gone to Alaska in past years. Some of the members, though wanting to organize and willing work, had never been to Alaska before. This precipitated an argument that lasted nearly two hours at one of the meet-

ings. 75 Per Cent Old Timers The question involved was not whether to accept men with no previous experience, but the percentage in proportion. After he smoke cleared away, it was decided to induct 25 percent new men as against 75 percent old

At about this time more than 1300 men had signed pledge cards. An elaborate set of demands were drafted and ap proved of by the membership the main points being \$85 monthly, for an 8-hour day, 71 cents an hour overtime for al work performed after eigh hours, wholesome meals and

sanitary living conditions. Other demands were blankets sheets and pillow cases fur nished by the company... stan dard prices for all things sole in company stores, all privi leges enjoyed in the past were not to be forfeited, no member of the union would be asked to walk through a picket line to do any work, bosses to be hired from the union hall, etc.

Packers Stalled

The following day negotiation: with the packers got under way. The negotiating commit tee—headed by George Woolfe president of the Scalers Union Fred West, of the Labor Coun cil, and others—started on daily treks to the office of the pack ers, only to be deadlocked time efter time over some trivia The packers were stalling for time and our commtitee

At this stage of the game Brother West went north to sec what was being done in the way of a union. On reaching there he found he was too late to prevent the signing of an agreement that was no doubt to sab otage our demands.

They signed for \$50-\$55 monthly, a 10-hour day, 30 cents n hour after 10 hours.

It was a body blow that without doubt took the wind out of our sails. But our negotiating committee kept on fighting stubbornly. Solidarity of Workers





The People's Health

By Franklin E. Bissel, M. D. SOVIET ABORTION LAW

At present, throughout Soviet Russia a widespread discussion is being carried on as to whether or not a law should be passed prohibiting abortions. As long as it is still under discussion in the Soviet Union, I think that we would not be amiss in also discussing it in this country.

I remember discussing the question with a young Soviet doctor when I was in Russia in 1932. He believed that the number of abortions should be reduced through prohibiting them. "But why," I asked, "Force a woman to have a baby if she does not want it at that particular time?"

"There is a great shortage of workers in every field: in the collective farms, in the factories, in the professions," he said. "We must make Russia's population grow very fast."



Jessica Smith, writing in the July issue of "Soviet Russia Today," also gives as the chief reason in favor of prohibition of abortions the fact that Russia needs more workers:

There is a difference of opinion among medical men as to the harm that a skillfully-performed. ticed democracy in the Black For abortion can do. The majority, however, agree that they do no harm if not performed too close together. In my opinion, women should be given the freedom to have abortions performed. on themselves even at the cost of a somewhat. less rapid growth in population. The only prohibition that is necessary is the prevention of too frequent abortions for the sake of health.

Miss Smith, in the above-mentioned article, states that Russia does not need a much larger population in order to make war, as do Germany dication of the action many of our or Italy. I agree with this and therefore see no reason why the personal freedom of Russian women needs to be curbed even to this extent.



# LETTER FROM SHIPOWNERS A WRENCH'-KNG

#### Marine Firemen In Stand on Award Question

SAN FRANCISCO-A "psychological monkey-wrench" is what Earl King, secretary of the Pacific Coast Marine Firemen and Oilers, calls the letter signed by Thomas G. Plant of the Waterfront Employers Assn., to Harry Bridges, Pacific Coast ILA president.

King Explains Letter

The shipowners' letter, it may be recalled, called for modifications in the ILA award, and suggested arbitration.
