

# CALIFORNIA LABOR AROUSED BY POLICE-VIGILANTE TERROR, SALINAS State Highway Patrol Led Attack; Strike In Iron-Like Solidaity

Half Watsonville Labor Council Delegates Favor General Strike; Negotiations For Settlement Sought

SALINAS—Sentiment for a general strike is sweeping the Salinas Valley Area. Several mions are reported to have stated that their unions are ready to strike at a minute's notice. The tear gas bomb attack, led by state highway police on the Labor Temple here neightened the sentiment for a determined reply to the vicious terror raging against the

SALINAS-A raid on Thursday by Sheriff C.rl Abbott and 50 deputized vigilantes on temporry union headquarters proved a bust, for the ra ders found no arms in the building. Walter G. Matthewson, government conciliato, was ordered here to begin negotiations between

Strikers, revealing a well-knit discipline, presented any provocations by the police or vigilantes Thursday. The only incident was the firing on a group of scabs by a guard, by mistake. One

With the public proclamation by Sheriff Abbott, declaring a "state of emergency" and order-"every able bodied citizen between the ages of 17 and 45" to report to him to be deputized against the strikers, the class lines have been clearly and sharply drawn. All fink-minded residents who responded to this call were armed with pickhandles and other

On the picket lines women, composing at least 40 per cent of the 4000 lettuce strikers, were among the most militant, and warned by police to stay away from the picket lines, shouted their

determination to fight shoulder to shoulder wit the men. The strikers have been heartened by support from the State Federation of Labor convention.

Bloody clashes, provoked by the highway police, deputized strikebreaking elements, as Praises State Police; local and county authorities and police, began on Wednesday. Main and Gablian Streets have been the scenes of heroic battle by the strikers, resisting the

attacks of the armed forces of the shippers and growers. Gablian Street runs directly into the barri ades erected by the growers around certain sheds Merriam has definitely and selected for scab operations. On this street the pickets met and joined trucks trying to run lettuce without reservation lined up out of the sheds. Before the first battle on Wednesday, the pickets did not try to dump this squarely behind the Salinas ship- lettuce. One of the scab trucks turned a corner too fast and spilled some of the lettuce. The

other trucks were thus slowed up. Then the deputized vigilantes, led by Han's Strobel, a leading grower and shipper, came up and pulled guns on the strikers.

Strobel's two brothers, one striking with the Teamsters, another with the Fruit and Vegetable Workers Union, are among the most active on the picket line, showing how sharply the class lines

One of Strobel's brothers, Gillmore, could no longer stand Strobel's provocative actions, and taught the grower a severe lesson. Strobel, the boss, received a severe beating. After firing shots, the vigilantes, on Wedneslay, faced with the unshaken militancy of the

pickets, retreated. They were in actuality rescued by the state highway police. The state highway police moved into action on Gablian Street and in the gassing of the Labor

Temple even though these areas are not part of any state highway. The attack on the Labor Temple, in which there were several hundred unarmed striking workers, occurred at 5 p. m. Wednesday, after the gas bomb and shotgun attacks on the strik-

The workers, driven away at first, came back and re-formed their ranks.

A second attack by the vigilantes and state highway police followed.

After the second attack the vigilantes came down Gablian Street again, and the strikers started oward them. The vigilantes were stopped this time from going to the Labor Temple.

### BREWERS MEET IN S.F. HITS AT CIO SUSPENSION

#### Fight Looms At Typo Convention

SAN FRANCISCO.—The 26th annual convention of the Brewery Workers' International, in session here, threw its entire weight behind the Committee for Industrial Organization.

A unanimous vote condemnéd the suspension of the 10 C.I.O. unions by the A.F.L. Executive Council.

The resolution adopted, calling the suspension a usurpation of power by the Executive Council added that:

"The delegates to this, the twenty-sixth, convention of the International Union of Brewery Workers of America, most vig orously denounce the mishandling of this important controversy between industrial and craft unions in such a manner as to force a split in the Labor movement.

"We protest the threatened expulsion of the 10 leading unions as shortsighted, vindictive and as shortsighted, vindictive and illegal, and we demand that the executive council of the A.F.L. Frank Spector recall its suspension order and permit the question to be settled by the Tampa convention, to be held in November, where it constitutionally belongs.


#### Steady Increase In Cost of Living

## PUBLISHERS IN All Set For Big Ford Meetings NSEATTEP.

#### Crocodile Tears For Freedom of Press. Which They Deny

SAN FRANCISCO-It surprised nobody to learn that the California Newspaper Publishers Assn. doesn't like the News Guild strike against the Hearst Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

The publishers this week adopted a resolution in which the strike was attacked as a "violation of freedom of the press."

What the publishers mean by 'freedom of the press' was shown recently when northern California newspapers refused to print a statement by the Northern California Newspaper Guild, in reply to a slanderous attack on the Guild, by Roy Howard, head of the Scripps-Howard newspaper chain. Howard's attack, however, was given full

September 16, 1936. Governor Frank F. Merriam, State Capitol, Sacramento, Calif.

Dear Sir: The brutality now being used against the Salinas strikers and heir supporters and against mall children and women by the State Highway Patrol, Salinas police, deputies and bands of thugs terming themselves 'vigilantes" makes it mandatory on you to take the following steps immediately to prevent further shooting, beating and gassing of citizens generally and of men and women workers seeking a better standard of living for themselves and their fami-

1. Withdrawal from the strike area of all State Highway Patrolmen. The strikers are not using violence. The Patrolmen and other "peace" officers are using violence. 2. Immediate unconditional re-

lease of all arrested strikers and 3. An embargo on the shipment of more gas bombs, shot-

guns and other arms into the strike area. 4. The immediate arrest and prosecution of all armed, socalled vigilantes.

5. A complete investigation of all "peace" officers responsible for the gassing, clubbing and shooting of workers, promp unwarranted violence, with severest sentences imposed upon those responsible for the gassing of children.

6. That immediate steps be taken to protect the worker's Constitutional rights of Free Assemblage, Free Speech and Free Press and their rights to organize, strike and picket. Very truly yours, INTERNATIONAL LABOR DE-

BRAHAM LINCLN said: "A nation can not exist halfslave and half-free."

#### "Solidarity Forever!"

SPLENDID example of labor's solidarity is afforded by the strike of 4,000 lettuce shed workers in the Salinas-Watsonville area Teamsters refuse to haul the lettuce. Thous ands of Filipino field workers, although outside of the A.F.L., have refused to work in the fields during the strike of the shed work ers. Not only lettuce, but all other crops of the Grower-Shipper Vegetable Association have been placed on the unfair list by the Salinas Central Labor Council.

This is the first time, in the long history of California's many and bitterly fought agricultural struggles-marked by vigilante terror and violence loosed by large growers against the strikers—that such powerful solidarity has been shown.

The workers are determined to gain the chief demand of the strike-preferential hiring of union men. Upon this demand hinges the fate and future of the union. Wage increases, improved working conditions are important-but without preferential hiring these other gains don't mean much. Sheds could otherwise, be filled with non-union workers whom the growers and shippers could treat as they please.

This is keenly realized by the growers and shippers, who are ready to grant almost anything but the preferential hiring demand.

The cry of arbitration will no doubt be raised. But this key demand is one which, affecting as it does the very life of the union, the workers cannot agree to arbitrate.

#### Hitler Speaks Out

ITLER didn't mince any words at the Nurnberg Nazi Congress. He dropped all pretence of arming Germany for "defensive" purposes and openly declared that Germany must have the Ukraine-and would like Siberia and the Urals thrown in-in order that Germany might be "swimming in surplus prosperity.'

The following day Hitler for the first time hinted broadly at an anti-Soviet alliance existing between Germany and Italy-although the existence of an anti-Soviet pact between these two Fascist countries has been known for some time.

At the same time that Hitler announces his plans for a war of aggression against the Soviet Union, Italy breaks off all commercial negotiations with Soviet Russia, and Mussolini's cabinet votes extraordinary appropriations f or land, sea and air forces "to proportion our military preparations to the necessities of the international situation."

The time is rapidly approaching when the Fascist mad dogs of Europe will be unleashed against the Soviet Union, in a desperate attempt to maintain the stranglehold of Fascism on the millions of exploited German and Italian workers and peasants.

But the Soviet Union of today is not the Czarist Russia of 1914, when the German armies swept into Polish Russia. Every man, woman and child of the Soviet Union's mighty millions will spring to the defense of their Socialist fatherland.

Workers throughout the world, on the docks, in the mines, fields and factories, will demonstrate their support of the Soviet Union against the murderous Fascists.

Interesting is the poll recently conducted by the Review of Reviews, conservative magazine, among middle class readers, which reveals that in the event of a war between the Soviet Union and Germany even the sympathies of the American middle class would be overwhelmingly with the Red army.

### **USSR CITIZENS** ARE TORTURED Sentiment Is Revealed IN HARBIN JAIL

Arrests Linked With Provocations On Soviet Border

MOSCOW-Twenty-one Soviet citizens have been flung into jail by Japanese authorities at Harbin, Manchukuo, and subjected to incredible tortures, state reports from Harbin received here.

The arrests are regarded as part of the recent heightened provocations along the Soviet Far Eastern border by Japanese troops and troops of Japan's puppet state, Manchukuo.

The prisoners were arrested without any charges being brought against them, and have suffered terrible floggings by Japanese guards who have been ordered to extract "confessions" from the prisoners that they



### **GROWERS TRY** TO GET MORE CHEAP LABOR

Worker Denies That Men Are Needed In Stockton

By a Worker Correspondent STOCKTON. — There is an oversupply of labor here, but the Stockton Record of September 10 has a banner headline saying "Lack of pickers hits tomato harvest."

Under this headline we read that growers are making frantic appeals to the State Free Employment Office and WPA for help. Two big canners, representing the A. Hershel Canning Company and Flothill Products, Inc., are quoted at great length complaining how they must have more labor immediately or lose millions.

Stirring Appeal They also appeal to the Community at large saying if they lose millions the port of Stock-

ton will suffer. I wish to state that there is more than enough labor here to harvest these crops, but that the workers are just waking up and demanding a decent standard of living, including the eight-hour day.

Many of them are joining the Agricultural Workers' Union Local 20221 of Stockton.

Intent to Disorganize So naturally the Chamber of Commerce and Associated Farmers are attempting to disorganize the workers by creating an oversupply of cheap labor.

We call on all loyal workers to disregard these appeals to come to Stockton. In reality it is only an effort to prevent organization and get cheaper labor.

I have these few remarks to make about my resignation as City Organizer, Socialist Party, L. A. 1st: I have a clean five year record as an Unemployed, Labor,

and Farmer Organizer. I won't have it mired by a few Trotsky ites here using me for the goat to direct their counter-revolution. ary activities against the U.S.S.R. and thei campaign against the Communist Party U.S.A., by giving me the title of Organizer.

It isn't the titles we hold that make us what the title indicates, because I'm still a good, clean-minded organizer of workers' and farmers, even though I resigned from this job, and the Trotzkvites will soen discover it. I simply cannot organize workers on the basis of combatting the Communist Party-but only on the basis of a fight against Capitalism—that is the basis on which I have been able to make a good record of five years as an

There are not many in the working class interested at all in sighting the Communist Party-and the U.S.S.R. This is my experience of five years. My record must never be blotted up and mired with the mud-slinging of Trotzkyism.
