The strike on the East Coast is taking the form of sit-down strikes. In cases where the police attempt to drive the strikers off the ship, the ship is then declared struck.

EXPLAIN YOURSELF, MR. McGRADY

THE MARITIME workers who still had some faith in the Roose-I velt administration were surprised at the statement of its Coast. representative, Assistant Secretary of Labor Edward F. McGrady, since the strike began. The strike of 40,000 workers to defend their unions and their

bread and butter is characterized by McGrady as "sheer madness." And when the shipowners started their propaganda that the U. S. Navy place "skeleton crews" aboard the ships, Mr. Mc-Grady issues a sinister threat, ostensibly referring to "bankers, drug shortage. employers, or labor," but obviously referring only to labor and strike action, as a "challenge to the Government," "paralyzing the free flow of commerce," "endangering the welfare of the strike committee, pointing out nation," etc. "They are assuming a nosition that the Government that it opens the door to vigination," etc. "They are assuming a position that the Government must challenge to protect the state and the people," he says.

Is this the role of "impartial arbitrator," Mr. McGrady? Can you defend labor's right to strike in one breath, and issue such threats in the next, when unions exercise that right? Are not your statements exactly the same as the shipowners' propaganda against the unions? And who is actually "challenging the Government?" Did not the unions promptly accept the offer of Secretary of Labor Perkins' request for further negotiations, AND THE SHIPOWNERS REFUSED IT?

The strike, Mr. McGrady, is not against the "state and people," nor against the "welfare of the nation," unless you consider the shipowners as the state and the people, and the employers' welfare as the welfare of the nation. The welfare of 40,000 maritime workers and their families, and the interests of Organized Labor, are the only vital interest involved, and it is about time that the campaign speeches and promises of the Roosevelt administration were PUT INTO EFFECT by making demands on the employers, who provoked the struggle by their uncompromising stand, and putting the pressure of the government on

THE DANGER OF NEGRO PEOPLE'S LEADER IN CALIF. MARITIME UNION LEADERS FASCISM TOLD PÉDRO SAILORS

Donnelly, ILA Pres., Says "We Must Unite Now"

SAN PEDRO-In the midst of their strike against the shipowners, maritime workers met in Saïlors' Hall here to hear a symposium on Fascism. The sailors heard a discussion of the case of Lawrence Simpson, Sailors' Union member sentenced to a Nazi concentration camp. "Unite Now"

President Donnelly of I.L.A. Local 38-82, outlining the growth of Fascism in Europe, warned the men to be alert against this menace in the United States.

"If we don't unite now in this fight against Fascism, I feel sorry for what might happen later," he said.

Gifford Cochran, who saw Simpson in Germany, condemned the American government's betrayal of Simpson, an American citizen. But it was more than betrayal, he said. "If I had been arrested I would be free, for I have many influential friends. But Simpson did not have these. Now he has a

friend, mass pressure."

He closed by stating that every decent American and honest worker should rally to the defense of Simpson.

FEDERAL HIRING HALLS OPPOSED BY UNIONS HERE

Weaver Proposes To Prevent Control By Unions

WASHINGTON—Running true to form as a faithful retainer of the shipowners, Joseph B. Weaver, Director of the Bureau of Marine Inspection and Naviga-tion has offered a Federal system of bureaus for hiring sea-going personnel as a "solution" of the

maritime situation. Wants Them Quick He said he planned to ask in mediate approval by the Budget Bureau of a request to Congress for funds to set up and operate

such hiring bureaus.
Federal control of hiring as proposed by Weaver would pre-vent the union-controlled hiring halls, and under the guise of impartiality would lead to a return of pre-1934 conditions. Weaver claimed that under the "safety-at-sea" act proposed in the last session of Congress

his bureau had broad powers of regulating hiring conditions. As a result of experience with federal hiring halls during the war West Coast maritime unions lost faith in them, union officials state. Maritime unions are flatly opposed to such a system.

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Redouble Aid to Spain Workers

FRANCO'S Fascist hordes, armed with the most modern military equipment, are still outside of Madrid. The vain boasts made by the Fascists several weeks ago that the capitol would fall within a few days were shattered against the heroism of the People's Front forces which, though pitifully lacking in arms and ammunition, are performing miracles of heroism in defense of democracy. The people of Madrid, old and young, men and women, are determined to die fighting rather than suffer the unspeakable tortures of Fascist occupation!

The fighters for Democracy in Spain are not- only valiantly defending Madrid,—but have even launched a counter-offensive, and in several sectors are driving the insurgent

This proves once again that if it weren't for the undercover intervention of Italy, Germany and Portugal on behalf of the Fascists they would long ago have been crushed. Evidence of this intervention has piled mountain-high. Even correspondents of American capitalist newspapers have told of seeing German pilots flying German planes, and Italian soldiers manning Italian whippet

In face of this continued brazen violation of the non-intervention pact by the Fascist countries, they have been "acquitted" of guilt by the non-intervention committee! In view of the fact that the fate of Europe depends to a large extent on the outcome of the war in Spain, support of the People's Front Government becomes a vital duty for forces of democracy throughout the world. Here in the United States the support that has been given by American workers must be doubled. The civil war in Spain is now at a crucial stage.

On November 15th in San Francisco, and on the 22nd in Los Angeles, a delegation from the People's Front Government will be heard, as part of a tour throughout this country and Canada. The purpose of the tour is to describe the real issues of the civil war and to organize support behind the defenders of Spanish democracy. Among the delegation is Father Luis de Sarazola, a Catholic priest who speaks on behalf of the masses of Spanish Catholics.

These meetings should be given the widest possible support.

Collection of funds, medical supplies and clothing must be speeded up. The Spanish workers are fighting not only to keep Fascism out of Spain, but to check the advance of Fascism throughout the world. Their

Davis Orders Concentration Camps

CHIEF OF POLICE DAVIS of Los Angeles, who last year attempted to keep transient unemployed workers out of Southern California through a blockade of the entire state, is this year using forced labor against the transient workers.

These workers on entering the state, Davis declares, will be herded into concentration camps and forced to dig ditches. With Davis's typical arrogance he contemptuously refers to these workers as "hoboes" and "bums."

Chief Davis consciously blinds himself to the fact that there are tens of thousands of homeless youths and adults, forced to travel from state to state on the road and the freight train, in quest of jobs. Certainly these transient workers find no pleasure in huddling up in freight cars, eating whatever they can find-when at all, trudging the roads in search of odd jobs. Or does Chief Davis think they do it from choice?

These workers are jobless through no fault of their own. Concentration camps and forced labor are the Fascist remedies for this condition. California workers will not stand for the Fascization of the Southern part of the state by the Los Angeles police department.

The forced labor movement must be emashed, the projected concentration camps defeated. This is a splendid issue for the Workers' Alliance to take up and fight. It will be supported by trade unionists and other working class organizations.' Pressure should be brought to bear on the government by the Workers' Alliance for federal projects for these transient workers in all states.

Catholics and Free Speech

THE MONITOR," a Catholic newspaper published in San Francisco, carries in its latest issue a long editorial attack against the Communist Party, particularly upon a broadcast made by Vernon Healy, Communist candidate for Congress from the First District, in which he appealed for Catholic voters to vote Communist.

Pointing to the persecution of Catholics by the Fascist Hitler regime, to the heroic Catholic workers and poor Catholic priests who are fighting against Fascism in Spainand contrasting these with the freedom of religious worship in the Soviet Union-Healy cited the grave danger of Fascism in America. He urged all American Catholics to vote Communist, both for their immediate needs and to help build an anti-Fascist Farmer-Labor Party.

This was the essence of Healy's appeal. Yet the "Monitor" makes a vicious attack against the Communist Party because of its alleged belief in force and violence, and against the radio station for permitting the broadcast to be made. The "Monitor" also complains it could not get a copy of Healy's address, although the announcer invited all listeners to write in to the Communist Campaign Committee for a copy of the speech.

The Communist Party has time and again refuted the lie, spread by employer interests, that we are a party of force and violence. These tactics, we point out, are used by employers of labor and their vigilante and strike-breaking agents. We urgently suggest that the editorial writer of the "Monitor" read Earl Browder's report to the Ninth Convention of the Communist Party, which the San Francisco County Committee is sendng that newspaper, along with a free o of Healy's speech.

YOUR HEALTH

By F. E. BISSELL, M.D.

ACNE

Los Angeles, Calif.

DEAR DR. BISSELL:

I've had a mild case of aone ever since I was 15 years old. I want to know whether you think I should take the X-Ray freatment or avoid it. I've heard of and seen so many cases where the skin was very withered and pitted from this treatment that I'm a hit afraid to try it.

ANSWER-In the treatment of Acne Vulgaris (the "pimply" type of acne), most important for the patient is that he does not squeeze or manipulate the pimples in any way. If the patient does not observe this rule, much scarring may result. However, all blackheads should be removed gently.

Every night before going to bed, the acne victim should wash his face with hot, scapy water and then rinse with water as hot as he can stand. The skin is then massaged well, avoiding the pimples and washed again with hot, soapy water, then rinsed with warm and cold water.

If there are many pimples, lotio alba should then be applied. If there are

mostly blackheads, apply the following Dr. Franklin E. Bissell paste which the druggist can put up: Sulphur, 10 per cent; Kaolin, 10 per cent, in zinc oxide paste. Starches and sweets should be avoided, frequent sun-baths should be taken, and constipation a demogogue, "Buzz" Windrip, corrected.

If these simple measures do not attain sufficient results, special measures may be adopted by a physician. These include vaccines, milk injections, and X-Ray. In the hands of an expert, there is no danger of bringing about a withered skin. Most X-Ray treatments in clinics are under the direction of such experts.

SEEING RED

BY MICHAEL QUIN

OVEMBER 13th is the date set for the most unusual convention San Francisco has ever seen. All the authors, poets and journalists are going to come out of their caves for long enough right impatient with the regula- modeled after a pattern instead to assemble at the Pacific Coast Writers' Congress. They'll be pouring into the city by airplane, boxcar and tandem bicycle. Poets will be draining out of the attics by the hundreds. Scenario writers in pleated slacks and two-colored shoes will come motoring from the stucco bungalows of Hollywood. Novelists, playwrights, columnists, feature writers will be coming from all the cities, towns and villages of the Western States.

They are coming to discuss their problems-and God knows, there isn't anybody has more problems than a writer. And they are coming because a great many of those problems they cannot solve by themselves, but can do so by getting together.

A great deal has been written about the problems of the writer, and most of it hits the nail right on the thumb-and is that painful to read. There is only one man I know of who thoroughly understood the problems of the writer and was able to put them into a book that made sense. He is Jack London.

If every writer coming to the November congress would sit down right now and read Jack London's "Martin Eden," we could be perfectly assured that the coming conference would be practical and effective.

In the first place, the writing profession is the most chaotic, disorderly, unregulated, anarchistic business in the world. From the time a writer conceives an idea in his brain, gets it down on paper, finds a publisher, gets it read and accepted, and the publisher turns it over to the printer, the whole affair is a madhouse. Once it is in the hands of the printer, it passes through a sensible, organized process. The existence of strong printing trades unions and sensible working conditions has achieved a measure of civilization and common sense in this branch of the business. But when it leaves the hands of the printer and is turned over to the merchandizers, it again enters the realm of

PUNDAMENTALLY, writing is a means of communication. I don't care whether you're writing an epic poem or a letter to your Aunt; writing is nothing more nor less than a means of communication and is meaningless unless you have some way of delivering it to the person or public you are addressing. As regards the letter to your Aunt, that's easy. There's the Post Office. ery efficiently and sensibly organized.

But as regards the creative writer, the problem is more difficult. What stands between the writer and his public? There are 125,000,000 some odd (Note: A friend of mine says they're mostly odd) people in the United States. I figure at least ten per cent of them want to be writers. But, to avoid any charges of exaggeration, I'm willing to cut the figure in half. Let's say five per cent. That would be 6,250,000 people who want to

Okey! To serve the ambitions of these six million, there are no more than a dozen creditable literary magazines which pubern Writers' Congress in Scottish lish sincere stuff. Can you imagine six million people trying to Rite Auditorium in San Franget their stuff into a dozen magazines? The rest of the magacisco on the evening of Novem- zines specialize in cheap "dime novel" stuff, or else are trade journals, professional publications and the like.

Practically all of these magazines depend upon commercial advertising for their suport, and anything that the advertisers has agreed to prepare and read don't approve of is definitely "out." Judgment of the merits of a paper in the morning session the manuscripts submitted to these publications is governed by nothing more nor less than temperament, prejudice and a curious brand of black magic called "hunches.

semen, providing he is sucful in his attempt to frame King, Ramsay, and Connor San Quentin. From the very start it has been apparent Warren isn't interested in finding out who murdered Albers. He is out to convict these three union men and to discredit all union labor in the eyes of the public. 
