JOHANNESBURG.

TENSION remains at fever pitch at Linokana in the district of Zeerust, where a fortnight ago the local Native Commissioner arbitrarily deposed the Chief of the Baphurutse tribe, Chief Abram Moiloa.

The number of those arrested following tribal demonstrations has mounted to 86. Last week a large body of women conducted a dramatic 'pass raid' on the minority who had taken out passes and after collecting a pile made a bonfire of these reference books.

SACPO Conference Votes For Boycott Policy

Separate Representation Act Rejected

A DECISION to boycott all elections held under the Seperate Representation of Voters Act and calling for full and equal franchise rights for all people, irrespective of race or colour, was adopted by 23 votes to 8 at the first annual conference of the S.A. Coloured People's Organisation held in Cape Town last week-end.

In furtherance of its boyeott decision, the conference instructed the imming executive connected to:

1. Sponsor the holding of a National Convention of people's representatives so as to reach the maximum agreement on the tactics to be adopted in implementing the boycott of the Act.

2. Negotiate with the other Congresses with a view to achieving unanimity on this issue.
