## Swart Amends Prisons Bill-Thanks To New Age

THANKS to the exposure by New Age, Mr. Swart's proposed iron cur-tain round the prisons has been lifted a little.

Bowing to the widespread Bowing to the widespread criticism of his new clause in the Prisons Bill making it an offence to publish any information about a prison, prisoner or ex-prisoner without the written authority of the Commissioner of Prisons Mr. Commissioner of Prisons, Mr. Swart in the Assembly last week agreed to replace it with a clause reading as follows:

"Any person who, without the authority in writing of the Commissioner, publishes any false information concerning the behaviour or experience in prison of any prisoner or ex-prisoner or concerning the administration of any prison, knowing the same to be false, or without taking reasonable steps to verify such informa-tion (the onus of proving that reasonable steps were taken to verify such information being on the accused), shall be guilty of an offence . . ."

Though the original ban on pictures or sketches remains (unless the authority of the Commissioner is obtained), this new clause is a considerable improvement on the original.

## HANDS OFF NYASALAND

THERE should be no illusions about what is going on in Nyasaland. It is imperialism, naked and ruthless, using brute force to smash the freedom forces of the Nyasaland African people.

The Africans of Nyasaland did not want Federation in the first place. They were forced into it against their will, and have been struggling to get out of it ever since. With the advent of Dr. Banda and the launching of an intensive propaganda campaign, the struggle was pushed to new heights and the broad masses of the people were drawn in behind the Congress leader-

In an atmosphere of tension, it is not really important to determine who threw the first stone. The basic question at issue is: are the Nyasa people to rule themselves or are they to be dominated by the imperialists?

To this question there can be only one answer: Imperialism must get out of Nyasaland. The Nyasa people must be free to determine their own destiny.

Nobody believes the fairy story which the imperialists have cooked up to justify the campaign of mass murder which they are now waging against the Nyasa people—that Congress had planned to murder 8,000 Europeans in the territory, and had drawn up a list of their victims headed by the Governor, Sir Robert Armitage.

The Governor himself last Friday "declined to answer questions about evidence against the detainees, nor would he enlarge on details of the massacre plot, which, he said, was still top secret." (Cape Argus, March 6.) A front-page headline in the Argus the following day read: "Written evidence of plot sought."

The report said that "security men in Nyasaland are working round the clock to sift a truckload of letters and documents seized from African National Congress headquarters throughout the country during the past few days. It is believed that the documents will provide evidence of how the ANC massacre plot was to be put into operation.

In other words, the imperialists have no evidence which will bear public scrutiny. But meanwhile, on the basis of a plot which doesn't exist, their troops are shooting down Nyasa men and women in a ruthless campaign of reprisals. Once again, imperialism is drowning in blood the struggle of an oppressed people-to

### White Africa Moves

Nor will it be forgotten that in this crisis the whole of White Africa sprang to the imperialists' aid. The differences between Welensky and Lennox-Boyd were patched up overnight. Forces from both Rhodesias and from Tanganyika were thrown into the fight. British troops in Kenya were placed on stand-by and a new wave of arrests launched against the Kenya freedom forces. Our own South African gestapo made its contribution by raiding the offices of the S.A. branch of the Nyasaland African Congress.

With the utmost refinement of cynicism, Welensky, on the one hand shooting down the African people, on the other demands that they accept "that the vote and the properly constituted Parliament are the right fields for political expression, and the only source of Government."

If Welensky were to submit his government to the free vote of the people of Nyasaland, he knows what the outcome would be. That is why he prefers to use guns. "Partnership" is proved in practice to be as great a fraud as "apartheid."

There is now only one way to peace in Nyasaland-the imperialists must withdraw and the African people must be left to rule themselves. To save further bloodshed, democrats the world over must effectively voice the demand: "Hands off Nyasaland now! Release Banda and the other detainees! Let the Nyasa people decide their own future!"

GERMANY, THE KEY ISSUE The key issue of the talks, of course, was that of Germany. Mr. Kruschov has announced that in May the Soviet Union will with-draw from Berlin and hand over to the German Democratic Republic unless the west enters into negotia-

tions.
This is often described in the west as an ultimatum, but as the Mos-cow correspondent of the New Statesman pointed out during the talks: "If British ears hear the tick-ing of the Berlin time-bomb... Russian ears are acutely sensitive to the heavier throb of the clock whose hands are moving towards the hour when Western Germany will become a nuclear power.

Each side feels that error or mis-calculation now can lead to war— war within a few months over Ber-lin, or war within a few years when

the German Democratic Republic and the German Federal Republic; either separately or as a Confedera-tion, if they agree to form one.

For the other part, the treaty would be signed by those States whose armed forces took part in the war against Germany. The pro-posed conference would be atposed conference would be at-tended by these twenty-eight States, including China.

The Soviet Government is pre-pared to have preliminary discus-sions with the Western Powers before the full conference.

The essence of the actual proposal for the terms of a peace treaty is that Germany should recognise existing territorial boundaries, and both East and West Germany under both the Warsw Forder of the NATO and West European Union organisations. Within a year after the coming into force of the teaty, all foreign troops now stationed in Germany should be withdrawn, and all foreign war bases in Germany closed down.

Pending the restoration of German unity and the establishment of a united German State, West Berlin shall be a demilitarised free city.


