COMMEMORATION OF THE SIXTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF THE GREAT OCTOBER SOCIALIST REVOLUTION

November will see the commemoration of the great historic Revolution of 1917, when the economic foundations of the exploitation of man by man were for ever destroyed in Russia, and mankind advanced towards the unavoidable overthrow of domination of every kind.

The French, British and Portuguese empires in Africa have been overthrown. The former colonies, now independent countries, have their own say in the concert of nations.

Those victories are largely due to the help given by socialist countries, and in particular by the Soviet Union where, with victory of the October 1917 Revolution, the first link in the chain of human enslavement was broken and where imperialism has ever since encountered an insurmountable barrier, and retreated, and continues to retreat, while the progressive forces of the world advance towards more just relations between human societies.

Lenin was a man of tremendous scope, humane, cultured and intelligent, who placed all his knowledge and energy at the service of his people and all other peoples. He was a revolutionary who both theorised and put his theories into practice. He established the power of the soviets, the first workers' country, the first government of workers and peasants.

OMA has participated in the literacy campaign at every level and made an outstanding contribution, as these facts show.


THE ORGANIZATION OF ANGOLAN WOMEN AND HEALTH

OMA fights epidemics


