The Union comprises Mapam Parties, Youth Sections, Women's Organisations and Sympathetic Groups all over the world. Mapam Parties and Groups are active in Great Britain, Belgium, Holland, Austria, Italy, Mexico, Argentina, Uruguay, Brasil, Chile. In the U.S.A. the World Union is represented by "Americans for Progressive Israel" (A.P.I.); in France, by the "Bernard Lazare Circle" and "Mishmar" Youth Circle; in Canada, by "Friends of Pioneering Israel"; in Australia, by "Friends of Hashomer Hatzair"; in Argentina and Uruguay (in addition to the Mapam Parties in those countries), by the "Martin Buber Circle". In Argentina, Uruguay, Brasil and Venezuela, the Mapam Youth Sections are called "Mordechai Anilevitz Youth Sections" (in memory of Mordechai Anilevitz, Commander of the Warsaw Ghetto Revolt of 1943, who was one of the outstanding leaders of the "Hashomer Hatzair" Youth Movement in Poland). The "Haviva Raik Women's Movement" in Brasil, Uruguay, Chile, Australia and France - is affiliated as well (Haviva Raik was a member of a "Hashomer Hatzair" kibbutz and volunteer parachutist, who was dropped into Slovakia in 1944, participated in the Slovakian Revolt against the Nazis and was executed).
